THE WIND AND THE WAVES OBEY HIM --MARK 4:35-41--

INTRODUCTION:

As we have journeyed through the first four chapters of Mark, we have read of the miracles that Jesus performed, casting out demons, healing the sick, and disabled. All of these miracles were to demonstrate, to authenticate that Jesus was the Christ, the Son of God.

In the closing verses of Mark four we have another miracle in which the supernatural power of Jesus was dramatically displayed. Remember that His disciples had seen Jesus heal countless people, each miracle was a vivid demonstration of His supernatural power, but the miracle in today's passage is different, they had never experienced anything of this magnitude. They knew Jesus had authority over demons and disease. But the disciples were in no way prepared for the show of unbridled omnipotence that they would see and experience in this one evening.
